#### **Reflections from the Senior Pastor**

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It's that time again... time for another election. This time, it's the heated contest for PA's governor and State Senate and the surrounding air vibrates with the political rhetoric of the upcoming decision on November 8. The tasking of voting. I believe, is one of stewardship. While I am no politician, the Office of the Holy Ministry does speak for the fulfillment of all human history in Christ, not any particular way of walking through this history. The path to Christ is not so narrow that it cannot be walked either on the right or on the left. The choice is left to the individual conscience informed by faith but not determined by it, unless a candidate or proposed policy would require us to leave the path. No Christian can abandon the Gospel or the life, freedom and happiness of his neighbors.

Absent any disobedience to God, Christians are expected to participate in whatever just civic order they find themselves. The Christian movement rose in the early Roman Empire, and St. Paul, himself a Roman citizen, enjoyed obedience to the Imperia and prayer for any one in authority, identifying himself as "God's servant for your good" (Romans 13: 1-7). The temporal use of law is commanded by God to preserve life and order it justly according to the nature of the governed. In other words, a human community cannot be run like a zoo or slaughter house.

The established order in which we live is not an empire, nor is it a democracy in the strict sense. It is a republic, and in our present circumstance that means that citizens have the task of deciding who the deciders will be. Responsible participation in such a civic ordering means bringing your very best insight into the voting booth with you and choosing what and who better serve your wisdom.

All this presumes that we are paying attention to the candidates and the issues and seeking information from more than one source. Think about this: we know who Jesus is because there are at least five significantly different accounts of him (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John and Paul).

Of course, the New Testament authors earned the trust of the early Church by portraying Jesus in ways consistent with what they already knew of him. That's why their books are in the Bible, while those who used Jesus to spin their own theories and ideas are not included. Our modern media are suspected of being interested in political candidates not for their identity, but as ideological props. Sorting fact from 'spin' is not easy, but we've got to try!

Thus, the Christian conscience can walk the path to Christ through the voting booth on either side of the road. What such a conscience cannot compromise or negotiate, however, is *truth*. For example, I could not vote for anyone who seriously maintained that the sun will rise in the west and government must address the problem. That's not the world in which we live. But what about someone who accepts the argument that there is no such thing as human nature and we are—individually and collectively—free to define ourselves as we please? Does that describe the world in which we live? Extremes of both the right and the left are arguing just so; they're off the path.

I could not in good conscience vote for someone who is so philosophically open to the idea that my neighbor's rights and person may simply be vetoed by legislative action, judicial fiat or executive order if his/her existence comes in some way to be viewed as inconvenient.

When the 'due' in due process is deemed up for grabs, than any just society in is jeopardy. The Christian's conscience is committed to civic order that gives nature its due because nature is defined by God, not jury-rigged by ideologies.

So get out and vote and pick your candidates left or right, for your good reasons. But remember that we all, right and left, are God's possession, not our own.



**Call to Order and Devotions:** John Emrick called the meeting to order at 7:02 PM. For devotions, Pastor Domines read a selection from The Gospel of St. Luke and offered a prayer.

Consent Agenda: Wendy Gitt had sent out the July 12, 2022 Council minutes to all members. The August Financial Report had also been received. A motion was requested to approve these meeting minutes, approve the check register/bills and the receipt of the monthly Financial Report for audit. Cheryl Boyd made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda, and Theia Hofstetter seconded it. A vote was taken, which passed unanimously.

#### **Committee Reports:**

**Finance:** Terry Thome made a motion that effective September 1, 2022, our fee for substitute organist will be as follows: one service is \$160.00 plus mileage; two services is \$200.00 plus mileage; three services is \$240.00 plus mileage; and if more than one service and one of them is on a Saturday evening, add \$50.00. **Property:** The Property Committee met in August. Bahret will begin its inspection of the nave on September 8, 2022 with a forthcoming estimate for possible work. The carillon work will follow at a later date. Harold Kristensen is reviewing the present security system contract.

**Worship:** The first communion was held at Masonic Village's Healthcare Center on Monday morning, August 15, 2022, and 25 persons attended it. The altar guild training meeting will occur on August 23, 2022.

They also had a seven-mile canoe trip and were the choir at Westport Church. They will give a video presentation of their trip on Rally Day, Sunday, September 11, 2022.

**Bank Tellers:** For the month of September, bank tellers are Terry Thome for Saturday at 6 PM, Ken Beard for Sunday at 8:15 AM and Theia Hofstetter for Sunday at 11 AM.

**Nominating Committee:** They continue to work on a proposed slate of officers for 2023.

**Pastoral Reports:** Both pastors submitted reports.

Special Requests: Prayers were offered for individuals. At the same time, John Emrick read the names on the Prayer List. We concluded the meeting by reciting the Lord's Prayer.

Motion to Adjourn: **Cammy Anderson made a motion to adjourn** the meeting, which was approved by all. The meeting ended at 9:00pm.
